### Relationships & Sex Education (RSE)

Years 3 – 6

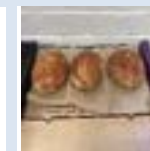
At Riverbridge Primary School, an important part of the Jigsaw PSHE programme is delivered through the 'Relationships' (Puzzle 5) and 'Changing Me' (Puzzle 6). These include the statutory and age appropriate RSHE (Relationships, Sex & Health Education) given to schools by the DfE in September 2020 which has a strong focus on emotional and mental health and wellbeing.

The mention of the phrase 'sex education' can sometimes create unnecessary anxiety for parents and carers and we want to reassure you that the focus of RSE in primary schools is broader than you might think. We believe that this work is vital to support children's personal development and underpins their understanding of themselves as they grow and change; and we know that this is most effective when parents/carers and school work in partnership. We want all of our children to be safe, healthy and happy. 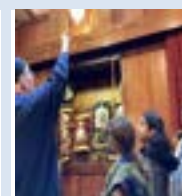

**Philanthropist**



Yash Gupta is an American man who, as a teenager, broke his glasses. The glasses took around a week to fix and this meant he was unable to see properly or focus on his learning.

Instead of thinking just about his own plight, he stopped and thought about all the children and young people around the world who did not have the luxury of access to glasses.

Having researched this, he found over 13 million children did not have proper glasses to help them learn.

He established a charity - Sight Learning- to help him find glasses for the children around the world that need them. Since 2011, he has supported over 20 000 young people to see better.

His 'words of wisdom' were a useful reminder to show your passion for projects and the difference that can be made when you apply yourself to something:

*‘Children are passionate and can make a difference.  
It’s just a matter of finding out what you care about and focusing on that.’*

## 1 Encourage journalling

Just like Riley, encourage your older children and young people to express their emotions and thoughts through journalling. It can be less confronting than speaking out loud and is a helpful way to process what is going on.

## 2 Make space for reflection

When children and young people reflect on their different emotions, it can help them better understand themselves and what they need.

Go for a walk, drive, or try some mindful colouring or baking together.

## 3 Be visual

Use imagery, such as emojis or flashcards to help children and young people recognise and label their feelings.

## 4 Practice mindfulness

Try mindful activities, and quiet family time, to enjoy being in the present moment. This can help children and young people be aware of their thoughts and emotions and learn a useful new coping technique.

## 5 Communicate

Feedback is crucial for helping us see our blind spots and gain greater insight. Children and young people are no different. Creating safe and supportive ways to share your own experience with your child can help them understand themselves and their impact on the world around them.

## SPONSORED SCOOT

Dear Parents/Carers,

During the week commencing **24 February 2025**, Riverbridge children can participate in a sponsored scoot. This will take place during school time (PE lessons) and will not only be lots of fun but a good opportunity to raise funds for our school.

Each child will complete 5 laps of the Scooter Assault Course. Each lap will present a different challenge appropriate to the age and ability of the child. The course will include:

- A simple lap of the playground
- A lap weaving in and around a series of cones
- A lap with a high bar - children need to pass under without knocking over
- A lap following arrows on a line of tape stuck to the floor
- A lap where balls will be collected and placed in a basket



As the Sponsored Scoot will take place during PE lessons, just send them in on their usual PE day, wearing their PE clothes and let them scoot into action! If possible, children will need to bring their scooters (labelled with their name).

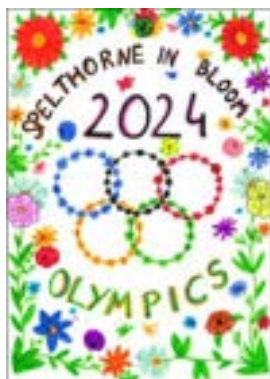

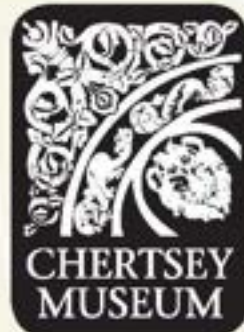
